Standard Chartered launches Singapore's first HIV awareness programme for migrant workers

5 April 2009, Singapore - Standard Chartered kicked off its 'Living with HIV' education programme for migrant workers in partnership with the Humanitarian Organisation for Migration Economics (HOME) to raise awareness of HIV/AIDS amongst the migrant community in Singapore.

There are approximately a total of 760,000 migrant workers¹ working in industries such as construction, shipyard, manufacturing and services, of which about 23 per cent are domestic workers. This programme will first focus on educating the domestic workers.

The Bank will partner HOME to train 25 volunteers who will in turn deliver peer-topeer education workshops for these migrant workers.

In the past 25 years, over 30 million people have died from AIDS-related illnesses. There are currently more than 33 million people living with the HIV virus and there are 6,800 new infections daily. Globally, women account for half of all HIV infections—this percentage has remained stable for the past several years². With no cure of vaccine for HIV, education is key to prevention of new HIV infections.
